MINUTES

I. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 6:30 p.m. by Chair Hollimon.

II. Roll Call:

Members Present: Commissioners Aisha Ali, Robert Boyd (attending remotely), Tom Harkins, Geoff Hollimon, Leah Kuipers, Roberto Valdizan, Karen Wagner (attending remotely), and Jack Winkels (attending remotely). Also attending was student commissioner Samuel Strong.

Members Absent: Commissioner Adam Stout.

Also Present: Director Tony Paetznick, Council Member Graeme Allen and Dave Matteson (Allina Health).

III. Approval of Agenda

Motion by Wagner, seconded by Harkins to approve the November 14, 2022 agenda as presented. Motion carried 8-0.

IV. Approval of Minutes

Motion by Wagner, seconded by Winkels to approve the October 10, 2022 minutes as presented. Motion carried 8-0.

V. Presentations and Business Items

A. Introduction of New Commissioners

Director Paetznick introduced the newly appointed Commissioner Tom Harkins to the group.

Commissioner Harkins introduced himself to the Commission and stated he looked forward to serving the community on the Public Safety Commission.

B. Ambulance Operations – Dave Matteson

Dave Matteson provided the Commission with an update on ambulance and EMS service operations for the State of Minnesota. He explained who made up the EMS regulatory board, noting this group was established in 1995. He reviewed the role of the regulatory board

which included compliance inspections, investigations, and granting funds for EMS regional programs. He commented on the primary service area for Allina North Metro and local government rules. He discussed the difference between advanced life support versus basic life support for ambulance service providers. The role of the EMS Medical Director was described. He reviewed how EMS services were financed, noting New Brighton residents were not taxed for this service. The organizational chart for Allina was discussed, along with Allina's ACE and CAAS accreditations. He commented on the different types of external education and training his responders receive. He stated he appreciated the partnership Allina has with the New Brighton Public Safety Department and asked for comments or questions.

Discussion included:

- Mr. Matteson provided the Commission with information on how EMS workers handle situations where people do not want to get in an ambulance.
- Mr. Matteson discussed the number of individuals that are brought to the VA on a daily basis.
- It was noted the north metro has seven to fifteen ambulances working at any given time.
- Mr. Matteson commented on the number of EMT's the Public Safety Department has on staff.
- The Commission thanked Mr. Matteson for his detailed presentation.

VI. Reports and Updates

A. Allina Health – Dave Matteson

Dave Matteson provided the Commission with an update from Allina Health. He reviewed the calls for service numbers for September and October, along with year to date numbers for New Brighton. He indicated the community had roughly five calls for service day. He discussed how difficult it was to recruit dispatchers, EMT's and paramedics. He reported Allina was offering tuition grants at this time for individuals interested in becoming a paramedic or EMT.

B. Public Safety Update – Director Paetznick

Director Paetznick provided the Commission with an update from the Public Safety Department. He reported this week was Winter Weather Hazard Awareness Week as well as being National Crash Responder Week. He encouraged residents to drive carefully this winter and to give responders space when responding to calls on the freeway. He commented on the number of crashes the City has on a yearly basis. He explained he attended the International Association of Chiefs of Police Conference in Dallas, Texas last month where the department received a Leadership in Community Policing Award. He discussed the Santa Cop program, which has been helping families in need since 1995. He described training he received regarding lithium ion batteries, noting they were a rising cause of fires in some communities. He reported Mark Suggs left the City as the DEI Coordinator and the City would be rehiring for this position.

Commissioner Wagner requested Director Paetznick provide the Commission with information on the new traffic signals on Silver Lake Road. Director Paetznick stated he

could speak with staff, would run some analysis and could report back to the Commission at a future meeting.

Further discussion ensued regarding how the theft of catalytic convertors was impacting the community.

C. City Council Update – Graeme Allen, Councilmember

Councilmember Allen provided the Commission with an update from the City Council. He reviewed the results of the recent election noting Mayor Niedfeldt-Thomas, Councilmember Dunsworth and himself were reelected. He explained the Truth in Taxation Hearing would be held on Tuesday, December 6.

VII. Adjournment

Motion by Kuipers, seconded by Boyd to adjourn the meeting at 8:08 p.m. Motion carried 8-0.
